## RECOGNITION DECISION SUMMARY

### SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS COMMISSION ON COLLEGES (SACSCOC)

In accordance with the [2010 CHEA Recognition Policy and Procedures, Paragraph 43](#), this summary describes the formal action taken by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) Board of Directors with regard to an accrediting organization seeking recognition by CHEA.

Date: CHEA Board of Directors Meeting, September 28-29, 2015

Decision: Recognition for up to ten years

The CHEA Committee on Recognition and the Board of Directors reviewed the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). The review was based on the six CHEA recognition standards that require an accrediting organization to show that its accreditation process advances academic quality, demonstrates accountability, encourages self-scrutiny and planning, employs fair and appropriate procedures and demonstrates ongoing review of practice, and that it possesses sufficient resources to carry out its accreditation processes (2010 CHEA Recognition Policy and Procedures, Paragraphs 12A-12F, pp. 4-8).

SACSCOC demonstrated that it meets these standards and that its accreditation process is consistent with the quality improvement and accountability expectations that CHEA has established.

The CHEA recognition policy requires that an accrediting organization undergo a recognition review at least every 10 years and submit two interim reports.

#### **Prior Actions on ACCJC's Application for Recognition**

**CHEA Board of Directors Meeting, January 6, 2015:** The CHEA Committee on Recognition and the Board of Directors reviewed the response to the deferral provided by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). The board of directors accepted the first of two reports as SACSCOC implements a clear standard that meets the requirements of 12B.1 that requires institutions or programs to routinely provide reliable information to the public on their performance, including student achievement as determined by the institution or program (Paragraph 12B.1, *2010 CHEA Recognition Policy and Procedures*). SACSCOC is required to provide second report.

CHEA Board of Directors Meeting, April 28-29, 2014: The CHEA Committee on Recognition and the Board of Directors reviewed the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). The review was based on the six CHEA recognition standards that require an accrediting organization to show that its accreditation process advances academic quality, demonstrates accountability, encourages self-scrutiny and planning, employs fair and appropriate procedures and demonstrates ongoing review of practice, and that it possesses sufficient resources to carry out its accreditation processes (*2010 CHEA Recognition Policy and Procedures*, Paragraphs 12A-12F, pp. 4-8).

The Board of Directors deferred action on recognition in order that SACSCOC implement a clear standard that meets the requirements of 12(B)(1) that requires institutions or programs to routinely provide reliable information to the public on their performance, including student achievement as determined by the institution or program (Paragraph 12(B)(1), 2010 CHEA Recognition Policy and Procedures). SACSCOC is required to provide two reports.
