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Institutions can properly undertake the work expected of them by the community which supports them only if they have freedom of choice and of action.




This does not exempt them from public interest and criticism, nor does it mean that their policies should not be under review by themselves, and by others.

#### SOCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY

Social accountability is "an approach towards building accountability that relies on civic engagement, i.e. in which it is ordinary citizens and/or civil society organizations who participate directly or indirectly in exacting accountability"





#### SOCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY

core definition of social accountability is a proactive process by which officials of autonomous institution inform about and justify their plans of action, their behavior and results and are sanctioned accordingly"
